Our Spring Meeting Schedule



March

Pamela George, Manager of the Family Resource Program, an emergency social services component of the Kroc Center, will speak about the program's services and the people they serve.

April

Community Pace Car Project Update

Take the pledge to become a community pledge car. When you display the Community Pace Car decal and drive the speed limit, you also set the pace for other cars behind you.

You can complete the attached pledge form and mail it to us at RPCC, PO Box 152352, San Diego, CA 92195 or drop it off at one of our monthly meetings. You can also take the pledge on-



line at our website (http://rolandopark.org/cause/ready-to-take-the-pace-car-pledge/). We'll deliver a decal to you within a few days. We have removable adhesive decals for the inside of your rear window or magnetic decals for the outside of your car. Just indicate which decal you want on the form.

As more residents take the pledge, we will be adding signage around the community to make drivers aware that we are a pace car community and follow the 25 mph speed limit.

Rolando Park is Officially a Banner District!



Last year, one of the top priorities voted by community council members was community identity. In spring 2017, board members Gerrie Flaven and Lynn Edwards applied for funding to create a banner district along our College and University borders in order to create a community identity and also create banners for our business district as the first step in jump starting what we hope will be revitalization and redevelopment on University Ave. In May, we were notified that we had been awarded

funding and after several months of navigating through the city process for banner districts, we received word last month that our proposed banner district would be on today's City Council's agenda.

At the February 6 meeting, the City Council authorized and established the Rolando Park Banner District. In her official comments, City Council President Myrtle Cole gave the following statement:

"... This is an exciting item for the Rolando Park community and I am so glad to move it forward. Today's action will establish a banner district for Rolando Park and allow the community council to install a series of banners along public streets within the Rolando Park neighborhood, including along parts of College Avenue and University Avenue that are outlined in the ordinance.

Rolando Park is a beautiful neighborhood with such an active community, and I know how eager the residents are to raise their profile of and publicize opportunities for neighbors to get involved with the community council and local events hosted in the district.

 \dots I look forward to the unveiling of the banners this spring."

RPCC is hosting a community-wide celebration for the official unveiling of the banners on March 14. See the enclosed flyer for details!

Our 2018 Priorities

Every January, members suggest priorities for the coming year and then vote on their first, second, and third choices. Here are our 2018 priorities and planned action:

1. Improve Rolando Park Business District

In late 2017, as part of the Banner District project, RPCC board members talked with most of the Rolando Park businesses on University. Many owners are also interested in seeing revitalization and improvement to University Avenue. Look for a Rolando Park Community Council Business Group to launch sometime in the next few months. We want to work with business owners to clean up the appearance of University and see if we can attract new development. There will be many opportunities for members to participate and volunteer.

2. Traffic – Volume and Speeding

Traffic is still a priority for our community this year. RPCC will continue to promote the Community Pace Car project to encourage residents to be aware of their speed when driving in our community. We will also work with Traffic Engineering to try to secure the three traffic calming radar speed display signs that traffic studies showed last year are warranted and also look for other options to reduce volume and speeding.

3. Pocket Park Improvement

The homeless camp was vacated in January and Environmental Services

cleaned the site in mid-February. We hope to have the landscape trimmed back this spring.

4. Highly Visible Crosswalks/Walkable Neighborhoods

Last year, several requests to Traffic Engineering for marked sidewalks in the community were turned down. This year, board members will be contacting Circulate San Diego and Vision Zero and looking for their recommendations on ways we can keep our community walkable and safe.

5. Continue the Holiday Giving Tree

The 2017 Holiday Giving Tree reached its goal to give a gift to every student at RPE. We already have volunteers to drive next year's Giving Tree.

6. Presentation on the Homeless

The SDPD Homeless Outreach Team (HOT) will give a presentation at our March meeting.

7. RPE PTA Presentation

The RPE PTA will give a presentation this fall; check the fall newsletter for details.

Other suggested priorities were addressing unkept houses, adult protective services, an update on utilities undergrounding, and more participation in our volunteer Lean and Clean. These suggestions received only a small number of votes, but if anyone in the community is interested in pursuing any of them, please let us know.

This great tool for educators details needed skills in all subjects for each grade level, noting those that are new to that grade. In addition, each student's progress and growth are mapped by the teachers.

The PTA is extremely active. The Family Farmer's Market is a tremendous success, and is available to school families on the second and fourth Fridays of each month. The PTA, along with community volunteers, sets up a plethora of fresh fruits and vegetables along with other foods and families choose what they want.
